OH LA LA LAND at Mannerheim Gallery, a project initiated by Flaunt magazine, is celebrating the cultural crossover between Los Angeles and Paris, and the theme of Situationist philosophy.

OHLALAND is a utopia, inspired by a perceived need in the zeitgeist for connectivity and community, as espoused in the anti-capitalist ethos of French philosopher Guy Debord. Created with an eye to engage would-be digital consumers in a dialogue that ponders the phenomenology of existence in the contemporary consumer paradigm via exposure to groundbreaking art and sentiment. The Society of the Spectacle, an ode to humanity itself, describes the development of modern society and its concurrent degradation of human life. The quote by the German philosopher Feuerbach in the introduction to The Society of the Spectacle sheds a lot of light on the era we live in: "But for the present age, which prefers the sign to the thing signified, the copy to the original, representation to reality, appearance to essence... truth is considered profane, and only illusion is sacred."

The works are both traditional and modern. Based on a duality of sorts they stand as a reflection of modern society's paradox: there is a sense of a perfect confluence between the new-world grandiosity of Los Angeles — arguably the natural home of The Spectacle— Hollywood being at the epicenter of the concept of success; and the city considered the more traditional birthplace of art, fashion and sophistication that is Paris. From the profane to the sacred, OH LA LAND is an exhibition all about creating a positive, spiritually rich reaction to the consumer capitalist machine's air-conditioned nightmare; it's about a reconnection to the soul, and ultimately the purpose of art in society.

It's via a shared love of unfettered cultural intervention that Mannerheim Gallery, Flaunt magazine and Each x Other have come together to create a series of Oh La La Land interventions designed to inspire. An exclusive line of t-shirts and sloganeering posters, all of which will premiere at Mannerheim gallery before going on to retail.
